### Technology's Impact on Standards of Care

#### Opening Plenary Session

Thursday, December 9, 12 noon – 2:00 pm

Join internationally renowned clinicians and clinician researchers as they focus on the changes that research and technologies (including bioinformatics, telehealth, imaging, etc.) have already brought to health care delivery and promise to bring in the future.

*David Valle, MD*, of the Institute of Genetic Medicine and Pediatrics Department at the Johns Hopkins University, School of Medicine, will focus on the impact and spectacular successes of the human genomic project and genetic medicine. Learn about the wider technology changes in biomedical imaging and bioengineering from a broad health care perspective.

*Charles Wormington, OD, PhD, FAAO*, of the Pennsylvania College of Optometry, will focus more directly on the implications of these advances in the direct delivery of primary eye and vision care and implications for optometric education in the next 10 years.

The luncheon plenary session will herald four days of the best continuing education: lectures, workshops, symposia, papers, posters and exhibits.

#### Monroe J. Hirsch Memorial Research Symposium

The 2004 Hirsch Symposium, **The Genetics of Ocular Disease**, develops the theme introduced at the opening plenary session: **Technology's Impact on Standards of Care**. The keynote speaker is Ian M. MacDonald, MSc, MD, CM of the Department of Ophthalmology, University of Alberta, Edmonton, Alberta, Canada. He will launch the symposium with a discussion of our current understanding of ocular genetics. He will be followed by speakers who will be discussing the most current research findings related to cataract genetics, ophthalmic gene therapy and glaucoma. Robert Wojciechowski, OD, MSc, Johns Hopkins University, Bloomberg School of Public Health will discuss the impact of this extremely important area on the profession of optometry.
